SCHOOL RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT IN NKAMBE, CAMEROON, NEARS COMPLETION

The reconstruction of Catholic School Moh in Nkambe, North West Region of Cameroon, is nearing completion. As of April, interior and exterior plastering work was underway, with final touches being added by SHUMAS technicians. The Building Schools for Africa and SHUMAS project is set to revive increased enrollment and improve academic outcomes for the 2025/2026 school year. Besides building three classrooms with furniture and providing an office and store to CS Moh, the initiative teaches children gardening skills, promoting sustainable agriculture, a key part of our economy.



SHUMAS CONTINUOUS THE MONITORING OF EDUCATION PROJECTS FOR CRISIS-AFFECTED CHILDREN IN CAMEROON'S NORTH WEST REGION

In April, Strategic Humanitarian Services (SHUMAS) continued its third-party monitoring of the UNICEF-ECHO II project in Cameroon's North West Region, which supports crisis-affected children through education, WASH, and child protection initiatives. SHUMAS monitored 58 temporary learning spaces across six divisions in the NWR (Mezam, Bui, Ngohketunjia, Donga Mantung, Boyo and Menchum), collaborating with five implementing partners to ensure project effectiveness and recommend corrective actions. Additionally, SHUMAS joined ECHO and UNICEF for a joint field visit to assess progress and identify further improvements in Bamenda III and Bafut sub-divisions.

BUI SCIENCE LABORATORY: ENHANCING LEARNING AND PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT IN KUMBO

The Kumbo Public Science Laboratory, a joint project by SHUMAS and Citibank, continues to offer practical science education in biology, chemistry, and physics to students in Bui Division. In March, ICT training using the solar energy was provided to 11 youths, and six traumatized students received psychosocial support, fostering both academic and emotional development amid the ongoing crisis.

BUILDING A BRIGHTER FUTURE AT CETIC BILINGUE DE KOUPA-MENKE

To improve access to education for crisis-affected children in Koupa-Menke, Koutaba sub-division, SHUMAS, in partnership with Building Schools for Africa (BSFA), is constructing three new classrooms, an office, and a storage room for CETIC Bilingue de Koupa-Menke—a technical college serving 164 students, including 89 internally displaced persons from the North West region. Previously operating in just two overcrowded classrooms, the school faced serious space limitations. With construction reaching its final churning stage in April, the project also includes essential furniture and promises to create a more conducive learning environment for both displaced and host community students.

PARTNERS FROM BUILDING SCHOOLS FOR AFRICA VISIT SHUMAS IMPLEMENTED PROJECTS IN CAMEROON

On a recent working visit to the Northwest Region of Cameroon, partners from Building Schools for Africa (BSFA) carried out an assessment of ongoing projects implemented by SHUMAS Cameroon. The visit focused on two key initiatives: the Economic Empowerment for Education (E3) project in Bamenda and the Mendankwe Water Project.

In Bamenda, the BSFA team met with E3 beneficiaries, gaining firsthand insights into the impact of the program on women's livelihoods and children's access to education. The partners applauded the significant strides made by the beneficiaries in business expansion, income generation, and financial management. These success stories, alongside candid discussions about ongoing challenges such as limited capital and financial balancing, provided valuable lessons for future programming.

The visit also included a stop at the Mendankwe Water Project, where BSFA partners were pleased with the quality and reach of the initiative. The project currently provides clean, potable water to over 1,000 residents, addressing a critical community need and improving public health.

A highlight of the visit was the warm hospitality extended by the beneficiaries. Partners enjoyed traditional dishes, including the locally cherished abakuru, prepared by one of the women—a gesture that further deepened cultural connections and mutual appreciation.

BSFA partners commended SHUMAS for its impactful and community-driven approach, expressing confidence in the sustainability of the initiatives and reaffirming their commitment to continued collaboration.

FOOD FOR ASSETS FOR RESILIENCE (FFA RES): WFP AND SHUMAS CHANGING LIVES IN THE NORTH WEST REGION

Through the Food Assistance for Assets (FFA) for Resilience project, SHUMAS and the World Food Programme (WFP) are transforming lives across 14 communities in Cameroon's North West Region, including Baforkum. This initiative strengthens food security and resilience by supporting community-led agriculture and livelihoods. In Baforkum, the successful harvest of 218 kilograms of fish from community ponds has boosted nutrition and income, while preparations for maize and bean cultivation are enhancing food self-sufficiency. SHUMAS continues to equip vulnerable households with sustainable farming skills and productive assets, driving long-term development and resilience.

EMERGENCY PROJECT TO COMBAT THE FOOD CRISIS IN CAMEROON: INNOVATIVE FISH FARMERS COPERATIVE, BAFUT AND ATUMACHA COOPERATIVE, BAMBUI AMONG COOPERATIVES EXPERIENCING A TRANSFORMATION

My name is Neba Akongnwi Youmbissi, president of the Innovative Fish Farmers Cooperative Niko Bafut. I want to thank SHUMAS and WFP for bringing this program to my community. Before, we did not have enough tools to prepare the land, but SHUMAS and WFP have assisted us with hoes, cutlasses, buckets, digging axes, and watering cans, which have helped us with land preparation. All the group members are encouraged, and we have increased our farm size thanks to this. The second thing is the VSLA training that SHUMAS and WFP provided. It's been an icebreaker for the group members in general and me in particular. I loaned some money from there and paid it back with a lower interest rate. Thank you, SHUMAS and WFP.

My name is Doko Yvette Phebusi, and I am the secretary of the Atumacha cooperative in Bambui. I want to thank SHUMAS and WFP for bringing this program to our community. Before SHUMAS and WFP arrived, we were working our ridges locally without any measurements or dimensions. However, SHUMAS has taught us about ridge specifications, planting distances, and crop association techniques, and we have seen a great difference in the output compared to our traditional practices, where we used to waste land and produce low agricultural yields. I want to thank SHUMAS and WFP for this technical education. Now, I can teach my friends, family members, and the community how to respect planting distances and how to associate crops.

WFP AND SHUMAS INTENSIFY FIGHT AGAINST MALNUTRITION IN THE NWR, CAMEROON

Physical verification was carried out in all the 14 sites of the project. Screening for malnutrition was carried out for children 6-59 months with 271 children screened in total, 6 cases of MAM (3M, 3F) seen in Kedjom Keku, Nkambe and Mbei. During PV, 148 PBW (49%) of the case load was seen, 127 children 6-23 months (10%) of the caseload and 6 MAM cases (2%) of the case load were seen. The MAM cases seen during home visits will be added to those of the PV.

DONATION OF MICRO MINERALS , DEWORMING MEDICATIONS AND SENSITIZATION MATERIALS BY VITAMIN ANGELS

SHUMAS recently received essential training materials from Vitamin Angels to support the distribution of Vitamin A, Albendazole, and multivitamins, boosting efforts to combat child malnutrition. Building on this support, SHUMAS is preparing a series of impactful nutrition activities in May, including mass screening for malnutrition among children aged 6 to 59 months, distribution of Corn Soy Blend Plus Plus (CSB++), and community sensitisation on Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) practices in all 21 Health Districts of the North West Region.

UNICEF - SHUMAS NUTRITION PROJECT MAKING STRIDES IN LOGONE ET CHARI

The SHUMAS-led UNICEF Nutrition Project in the Logone et Chari division of the Far North Region is gaining momentum, with significant progress made during its first two months. Launched in March 2025, the project is dedicated to preventing, detecting, and managing malnutrition among vulnerable populations, particularly children aged 6-59 months, while also addressing the impacts of climate change.

As the project is rounding up in its second month, the focus is on intensifying efforts to achieve ambitious trimester objectives. SHUMAS personnel, in close collaboration with local health authorities and Community Health Workers, are diligently working to conduct mass MUAC screenings to identify children suffering from acute malnutrition, provide training to mothers on proper infant and young child feeding (IYCF) practices, and establish community gardens to promote food diversity and climate-resilient agriculture. Our teams are putting all hands on deck to reach close to 80% of our trimester objectives by the end of April. The SHUMAS-UNICEF Nutrition Project aims at providing a healthier future for the children of Logone et Chari.

ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT FOR EDUCATION PROJECT (E3) : AMINA HAS LIVELIHOOD SUPPORT AND HER CHILDREN NOW GO TO SCHOOL

"My name is Amina, a single mother and internally displaced person from Bum, now living in Bamenda. When I arrived, I struggled to provide for my children, especially their education. There were times we went to bed hungry. Everything changed when I met SHUMAS. They provided me with a business startup kit, including vegetable oil, flour, and gari, which I used to start selling chin chin and gari. This business has been incredibly profitable, enabling me to pay my children's school fees and support my family. Additionally, SHUMAS and Building Schools for Africa provided my children with free didactic materials. I'm deeply grateful for their support and kindness."

KUMBO BOREHOLE PROJECT MAKING PROGRESS

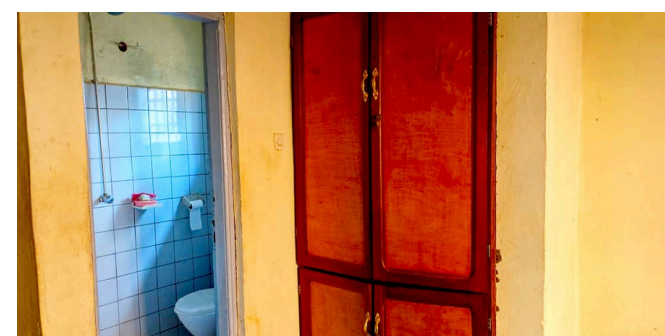
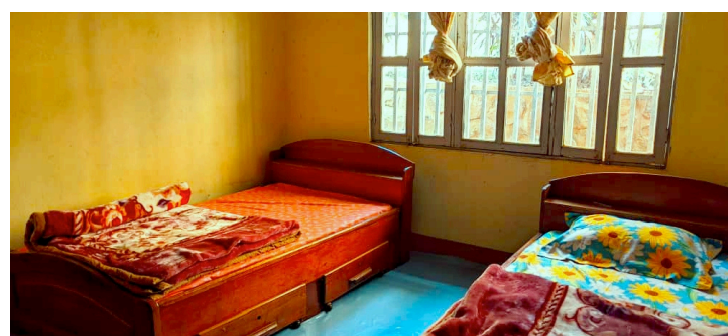
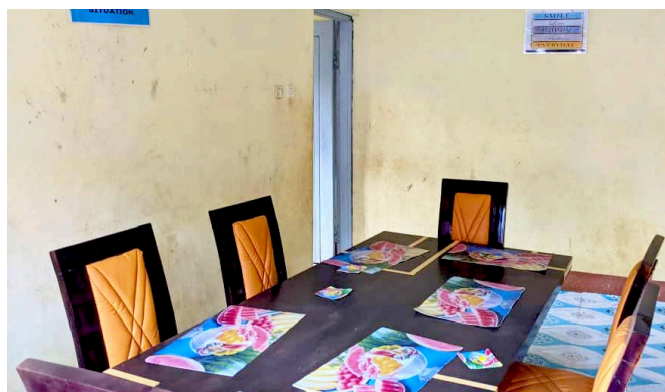

Speaking during the lay-in-state and decorations event at the Cathedral, Marianne Johnson, speaking on behalf of the BSFA Trustees from the United Kingdom, made a moving declaration that despite the passing of their long-term partner, their mission in Cameroon remains unshaken.

"We will continue assisting communities across Cameroon," she promised, her voice quivering with emotion.

"We have full trust and confidence in his wife, Billian Nyuykighan, who also doubles as the Programmes Coordinator. We believe she will carry on Stephen's work with the same dedication and heart."

Their written tribute in the funeral booklet summed up nearly two decades of collaboration and friendship:

"Stephen was unique: a powerhouse and a man amongst men. A light has been extinguished but his legacy remains... We thank Heaven that he and the SHUMAS management team had made succession plans in recent years, so that the wonderful work of SHUMAS can continue even without him at the helm."

The Trustees of BSFA, recounted how they met Stephen in 2006 while volunteering in Cameroon.

"He immediately impressed us with his energy and passion for helping poor rural communities. Ours is a partnership which seems to have worked miracles... We will miss his vision, his generosity of spirit, and his wonderful sense of humour. A light has been extinguished, but his legacy remains," they wrote

The emotional ceremony was further marked by a rare and prestigious national honour: on behalf of the Government of Cameroon, North West Governor Lele Lafrique Adolphe Tchoffo decorated the late Mfoome Stephen Njodzeka as Officer of the Order of Valour, an elevation that publicly acknowledged his decades of selfless service to humanity. It was a fitting tribute for a man whose life's work impacted more than 10 million lives across all ten regions of Cameroon and beyond.

In his own tribute printed in the funeral booklet, Governor Lele Lafrique lauded Stephen's contributions to the country's development objectives.

"He assisted the Cameroon Government in building over 1,000 schools... he was an exemplary developer and philanthropist. His contributions impacted lives in humanitarian and developmental axes," the Governor noted.

The homily by Archbishop Andrew Nkea, President of the Episcopal Conference of Cameroon, described the deceased as "a man of strong faith, a devoted Christian, and selfless leader... How can we forget the schools he constructed and equipped, the health centres, the drinking water, and electricity he brought to remote communities in Cameroon and beyond?" His Grace Andrew Nkea wondered allowed

Indeed, countless lives across the country and the Central African subregion bore witness to SHUMAS' great touch from classrooms in Kousseri to boreholes in Akwaya, and from health centres in Mbouda to livelihood projects in Bamenda.

His wife, Yaa Billian Nyuykighan, fighting through tears in her eulogy, described a partnership rooted in love, mutual respect, and shared purpose.

"We supported each other and celebrated each other... Your absence leaves a vacuum in our lives that can never truly be filled."

His 87-year-old mother, Mama Helena Ngo, captured the pain of a parent burying a son at the peak of his prime.

"My dearest son, I am overwhelmed with grief... I pray God welcomes you into His heavenly arms," she wrote.

Born on July 20, 1970, in Kumbo, Ndzerem Stephen's journey from working rice farms during school holidays to fund his education, to founding SHUMAS in 1997, is a story of grit, vision, and boundless compassion. A graduate in Private Law from the University of Yaoundé, he turned his entrepreneurial start with Hillman Company into a force for good, evolving into a humanitarian powerhouse that earned SHUMAS consultative status with the UN's Economic and Social Council.

Mfoome Stephen held several titles across Cameroon, reflecting his wide impact. He was also former President General of the Nso Village Cultural and Development Association (NSODA) and a member of the Civil Society Reconstruction Plan Committee for the North West Region.

His burial at his Ntamafe II Bamendakwe Upstation Bamenda residence marked the end of a week-long mourning period, which began with a wake in Maryland, USA, on Saturday April 5. Daily Masses at his residence followed from April 8 to 10, a wake on April 11, and then the final burial rites on April 12.

Though the earth has received his body, Mfoome Ndzerem Stephen Njodzeka's legacy lives in the millions of Cameroonian lives he transformed. And as Marianne Johnson reminded mourners, it is a legacy SHUMAS, under the capable leadership of his widow, will continue to uphold.

A humanitarian giant may have fallen, but his mission lives on.
